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## The Prompt:

ABOUT ME: [Tell me anything – your job, skills, hobbies, things people ask your help with, industries you know, or just what you're good at.]

AI skill level: [beginner / intermediate / advanced]

YOUR MISSION: Help me make my first dollar with AI. Based on whatever I shared above, find the overlap between what I already know and a high-demand digital product I can build and sell using AI.

PRODUCT SCOPE – the product must be built using AI as a core part of the creation process OR deliver AI-powered value to the buyer. This includes both finished products made with AI (designed templates, worksheets, asset packs, formatted documents) AND AI systems the buyer uses themselves (prompt packs, GPT configs, AI workflow guides). The key test is: would this take the buyer significant time, skill, or effort to create on their own? If yes, it's a valid product.

Examples: AI prompt packages that solve a specific problem (ChatGPT, Midjourney, Flux, etc.), AI-generated art packs, pattern sets, or design asset bundles, AI-generated social media content packs (background videos, reel templates, thumbnail sets), custom GPT configs or chatbot templates for a specific niche, GPT-powered calculators, generators, or mini-tools, curated AI workflow guides ("how to do X with AI" – packaged as a sellable system), AI template kits where the AI does the thinking (not just formatted text), Notion/Sheets templates with AI prompts built in so the buyer gets AI-powered results, AI-generated worksheets, workbooks, planners, or formatted documents, or any other product where AI gave you an unfair speed or quality advantage in creating it.

NOT in scope: products where the entire value is one or two simple AI prompts that anyone could type into ChatGPT themselves. The product must either be a finished, polished deliverable (designed templates, formatted worksheets, complete asset packs) so the buyer is paying for the done-for-you work – OR a prompt system complex enough that the buyer couldn't replicate it without serious effort. If someone could get the same result by typing a single sentence into ChatGPT, it's not a product.

SKILL LEVEL RULES – match the build plan to my AI skill level:  
BEGINNER = only PDFs, Canva designs, prompt packs, Google Sheets, Notion templates, simple text/image bundles. NO apps, NO web tools, NO automation platforms, NO code. Every step must be doable with copy-paste, typing, and drag-and-drop only. For beginners, default to AI prompt packs or AI-generated finished products as the primary product type unless there's a clearly stronger option. These have the lowest build friction, highest speed to market, and proven demand.

INTERMEDIATE = everything above plus simple no-code tools (Glide, Carrd, Softr), basic Make.com/Zapier automations, custom GPTs, simple Google Sheets formulas.

ADVANCED = everything above plus web apps, n8n workflows, API integrations, lightweight code, complex automation chains. If my level is beginner, and your best idea requires intermediate skills – pick a different idea. Never tell a beginner to "just use Glide" or "set up an automation." The build plan must feel easy at my level, not aspirational.

HARD RULES:
