Let Claude write your brief, filter sellers,
catch red flags, and pick the right freelancer
for you.

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Let Claude Hire For You

Last week I hired my first freelancer ever, on Fiverr, for \$500. Claude did almost everything: it wrote my brief, filtered thousands of sellers down to a shortlist, read the profiles and reviews for me, wrote my outreach messages, and compared the replies. It even talked me out of hiring one freelancer I would have picked myself, because of a red flag I'd completely missed.

This guide gives you the exact 5 prompts and the process, step by step, so you can do the same thing for whatever you need outsourced.

WHY THIS MATTERS (TIME & MONEY)

Hiring this out saves roughly 10 hours a month, about 120 hours a year, so you can spend that time on the work only you can do. If you're on the other side of this, taking on a project instead of turning it down works the same way: you don't have to build everything yourself either.



WATCH OUT

The only real risk in hiring is hiring the **WRONG** person. Every step below exists to protect you from that, not to make hiring feel complicated.

PART 1

Write The Brief

Everything starts before Fiverr. It starts in a Claude chat.

STEP 1 · THE BRIEF

A vague brief gets you twenty useless quotes

The number one reason freelance projects go wrong is a vague brief. “I need an automation” tells a seller almost nothing, so every quote you get back is a guess. Describe your project to Claude in your own plain words first, then let it turn that into something a freelancer can actually quote against.

Copy this prompt

TRY THIS PROMPT

“I want to hire a freelancer to build an automation for me. Here is what it should do, in my own words:

[Describe your project here in plain words — what comes in, what should happen, what should come out.]

Turn this into a short, clear freelancer brief I can send on Fiverr. Include: scope, exact inputs and outputs, the tools involved, and what a perfect delivery looks like. Keep it under one page. Ask me clarifying questions first if anything is unclear.”

REAL EXAMPLE

Real example: “Emails from my newsletter come in. Each one should become a LinkedIn post. If the email contains an image, use that image. If not, generate 3 image options and send them to me on Telegram so I can pick one or ask for new ones. Only after I approve should the post publish to my LinkedIn profile.” That's it, in plain words, no jargon needed.

TIP

Copy the prompt above, replace the bracketed part with your project, and send it to Claude. If it asks you clarifying questions first, answer them, that back-and-forth is what makes the brief tight.

PART 2

Search & Filter

Turn thousands of Fiverr sellers into a shortlist of three.

STEP 2 · SEARCH TERMS

What do you even type into the search bar?

You don't have to guess. Paste your brief back into Claude and ask it for the exact words to search.

 **Copy this prompt**

TRY THIS PROMPT

"Here is my freelancer brief: [paste brief]"

I'm going to search for freelancers on Fiverr. Give me the 3 to 5 best search terms to find sellers who build exactly this kind of project, from most specific to most general. Explain in one line why each term works."

REAL EXAMPLE

For a newsletter-to-LinkedIn automation, the winning term was simply "n8n automation", the name of the tool the system runs on. The more specific the tool name, the better the shortlist.

STEP 2 · FILTERS

Shrink thousands of results into a shortlist

Open the filter bar on Fiverr and go to seller level. Here's what each badge actually means:

Badge	What it means
New seller	Just joined. No track record yet.
Level one	Has delivered some orders.
Level two	Consistent delivery over a longer time.
Top rated	Fiverr's most vetted tier.

Check Level two and Top rated. Everything else disappears from your results.

Then check these three things yourself, on each gig page

- Rating above 4.8, but only if there are at least 100 reviews. A perfect score with four reviews means nothing.
- The "last delivery" line says days ago, not months. Keep this one in mind, it matters a lot in the next step.
- Response time under one hour. That's a preview of how the whole project will feel.

 **TIP**

If your project is genuinely business-critical, look at Fiverr Pro too. Those sellers are manually vetted by Fiverr itself, worth it for bigger builds.

PART 3

Vet The Profiles

Reading hundreds of reviews yourself? That's Claude's job now.

STEP 3 · PROFILE EVALUATION

Let Claude read the gig page and the reviews

Pick your 3 best-looking gigs from the filtered search. For each one, copy the full gig page and profile text into Claude with this prompt:

Copy this prompt

TRY THIS PROMPT

"Here is my project brief: [paste brief]

And here is a Fiverr freelancer's gig page and profile: [paste profile text]

Evaluate this freelancer for my project. Answer three things:

- 1. Does their actual experience match my project, not just in general, but the specific tools and workflow I need?*
- 2. What are the risk signals? Check especially: last delivery date, review count vs. rating, whether reviews mention communication and documentation, and whether their portfolio shows similar projects.*
- 3. What 2 to 3 questions should I ask them before ordering?*

End with a clear verdict: strong candidate, possible candidate, or reject, with the one main reason."

WATCH OUT

This is the part that saves you real money. All three real candidates looked good on the surface: solid ratings, decent reviews. But Claude rejected one of them, because his last delivery was three months old. Three months of silence, in a field where the tools update every few weeks, is a red flag for anyone who'll need support after delivery. That line was sitting in the open the whole time, it just never used to get looked at.

TIP

Keep your two strongest candidates, and add one more from the search results as a backup. That gives you three quotes to compare later.

PART 4

Reach Out

Message every candidate, without tripping Fiverr's spam filters.

STEP 4 · OUTREACH

One good message, sent word for word to everyone, is a mistake

⚠️ WATCH OUT

Sending the exact same message to several sellers can get your account flagged for spam. It usually resolves fast, but it's an easy problem to avoid entirely: never copy-paste your outreach.

Instead, hand Claude the profiles and let it write one personalized message per seller:

✍️ Copy this prompt

✍️ TRY THIS PROMPT

"Here is my brief: [paste brief]"

I'm contacting these Fiverr sellers: [paste the profiles or key details of each]"

Write one personalized first message per seller. Each message must: reference something specific from THAT seller's profile or reviews, include my brief in a compact form, state my budget of \$[your budget], and end with one question: which of their packages fits this project. Keep each message under 150 words. Make them clearly different from each other, no copy-paste patterns."

💡 TIP

Takes Claude about two minutes, and every seller can tell you actually read their profile before writing in.

PART 5

Decide Who To Hire

Not by price. Not by portfolio. By the reply.

STEP 5 · COMPARE THE REPLIES

The reply tells you more than the price ever will

Once the replies come in, paste all of them into Claude at once:

Copy this prompt

TRY THIS PROMPT

"Here is my brief: [paste brief]"

Here are the replies I received from the sellers: [paste all replies]"

Compare them. For each reply, tell me: did they actually understand the project or just send a sales pitch? Did they flag any technical details or risks I missed? Did they ask smart questions? Are there red flags like upselling without engaging with my brief?"

Rank them and recommend who I should hire, with the reasoning in plain words."

REAL EXAMPLE

One seller just pointed to a pricier package, without really engaging with the brief. Claude ranked them last. Another team wrote the whole project back correctly in their own words, flagged a technical detail that had been missed (the image generation needed a separate tool, and suggested the one already in use), and asked the right question before quoting. That's who got hired. When someone understands your problem before you've paid them, that's who solves it after.

TIP

If two candidates seem close, this comparison is the tiebreaker: hire understanding over polish.

PART 6

Work Together

Custom work is back-and-forth, not drop-and-done.

STEP 6 · THE DELIVERY

What actually happens after you click order

Expect near-daily back and forth, not a system that lands finished a few days later. Here's what's normal:

- The freelancer builds the workflow inside your own account for the tool, so it stays yours after they leave.
- You connect your own Gmail, LinkedIn, Telegram, or whatever else the project touches. Only you can approve those connections.
- A short Loom video walking through what they built and what they still need from you.
- Small hiccups along the way, like a credential that won't save or a setting only you can change. Normal, and usually fixed over chat in minutes.

⚠ WATCH OUT

Any freelancer who asks for your passwords instead of having you connect your own accounts: red flag, walk away. This is the one boundary that should never move.

👁 WHAT IT LOOKS LIKE — a real \$500 delivery

Trigger: a real newsletter email lands

Claude: turns it into a LinkedIn post draft

You: get 3 image options on Telegram and approve one

Result: the post publishes to your real LinkedIn profile

Support: 30 days included, message them if anything breaks

Before You Hit Order

Quick checklist

- ✓ Brief written with Claude, under one page, scope and outputs are exact
- ✓ Sellers filtered to Level two / Top rated, rating 4.8+ with 100+ reviews
- ✓ Last delivery says days ago, not months
- ✓ Claude's profile evaluation gave a strong candidate verdict, not a reject
- ✓ Outreach messages are personalized, not copy-pasted
- ✓ Hired based on who understood the brief, not who was cheapest

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
